Founded in the 1970s, York's undergraduate and graduate programs were the first in Canada to award dance degrees. Faculty members lead in the field—informed by the past, active in the present, and moving toward the future. Students investigate experiences and theories through studio practice, seminars, field trips, research, productions, and academic conferences.

A BFA in dance, or equivalent, with a B+ average or above in the last two years of study. Candidates are expected to enter with a full understanding of choreographic elements and a knowledge of dance history and dance aesthetics.
