Learning Log (15% of final grade)

Objectives:

- 1. To encourage students to look for examples of sociological significance as they occur outside the lecture hall.
- 2. To assist students to develop an understanding of the concepts taught in the lectures as they relate to "real world" situations.
- 3. To help students become more knowledgeable about sociological issues vis-à-vis sports and sport practices.

Instructions:

- 1. Students are required to make one entry per week in the Learning Log (total 10 weeks).
- Each week, by Thursday 11pm, each student will submit a new entry in eClass. Each entry must contain a brief comment (maximum one page in length, size 12 font, Times New Roman and double-spaced).
- 3. A weekly entry is defined as:
 - a) a link to an article from an online media source (with your comments) that relates to lecture material from that particular week;
 - a description of an issue seen online/social media (even from TV!) or heard on the radio/podcast (with your comments) that relates to lecture material from that particular week;
 OR
 - c) a link to information acquired from a research journal (with your comments) that relates to lecture material from *that particular week*.
- 4. The **final** Learning Log must be submitted in eClass by Thursday, November 30th, 2023 11pm.

Evaluation:

Each student's complete Learning Log should include ten weekly entries. All ten entries are required for the Learning Log to be eligible for final marking. The professor randomly selects 2/10 entries from each final Learning Log submission for marking. Each entry will be assigned a mark out of 7.5 (totalling 15). If the selected entries meet the criteria outlined above, the Learning Log will earn top marks. Work of lesser quality (e.g., poorly done, lack of depth of reflection) will earn lower marks.

Power-point Assignment (20% of final grade)

Instructions:

Students are required to prepare a 6-slide PowerPoint presentation. The topics will be assigned to students randomly on a list posted in eClass.

Your job is to identify the most salient parts of the topic assigned and create a six (6)-slide PP presentation (the cover/title and reference slides do not count among the 6 required slides).

You can select the whole topic (for example, Social Class) or part of the topic (i.e., social class of Canadian Olympic athletes). You can be as creative as you want. However, this is an academic work, thus well-written, insightful, and thought-provoking slides are expected.

Note: Use APA. Do not use videos and/or recordings.

Due: Submitted in eClass by Tuesday, October 5th, 2023 11pm

Assessment Components:

Content: Arguments made should be clear, convincing, well organized, and based on research and concepts introduced in class: 35%

Presentation The images, type, and other elements should be of good quality, and should be well placed, organized, and balanced on the pages: 35%

Originality/Wow factor: The presentation should be easy to read and understand, attractive, and demonstrate some new insight regarding the topic: 30%

Appeals Process:

Assignments are graded by an experience marker who is a knowledgeable and experienced one. You may ask for a grade reassessment on an assignment within a week after receiving the grade. This, however, is not an ordinary occurrence but an exception. Simply wanting a higher grade is not an acceptable reason for requesting a reassessment. If you feel that your assignment has been wrongly graded, explain why in a one-page, typed letter. Attach this to your graded assignment and hand it in to the Course Director. Your assignment will then be reassessed by me. Your grade may go up, down, or remain the same. Appeals process decisions are final.
