Expanded Course Description

This course is designed to satisfy the requirements of the Canadian Red Cross First Responder course within a sports medicine format. The course will be lecture, hands on and scenario based. Students will receive theoretical information, specifics on applying information in practical sports medicine situations, and students will participate in practice scenarios to reinforce the learning process. Students will participate in class discussions to complement required readings and assignments in the course. This course is required for the Athletic Therapy Certificate Program.

Course Objectives

(1) Brief statement of the purpose:

The purpose of this course is to assist students in developing first response skills within a sports medicine setting. Students will be able to critically analyse specific injury situations and then apply appropriate interventions to prevent further harm and mediate the situation.

^{**}This course has some scheduled extra classes throughout the fall and winter semesters. As well, students will attend some field and clinical events to support course curriculum throughout the school year. These aspects will be scheduled in consultation with the course instructors and consideration for student academic schedules. **

(2) Brief list of specific learning outcomes of the course:

- By the end of this course, students will be proficient in:
 - Assessing and managing airway, breathing and circulatory emergencies (including cardiopulmonary resuscitation and use of an automated external defibrillator)
 - Oxygen therapy
 - Assessment and care of musculoskeletal injuries
 - Applying theory to critically evaluate practical scenarios.
- Provide first year athletic therapy students with the skills necessary to provide entry-level health care to the
 athlete.
 - o Provide experiences that include sports requiring protective equipment.
 - Assign student to experiences which include their own and the opposite gender along with team and individual sport experience.
 - o Provide opportunities to work in a university varsity only athletes clinical setting.
 - o Provide opportunities for students to observe and work with a variety of health professionals.
 - Utilize up-to-date equipment as part of the athletic therapy clinic and lab settings.
 - Expose students to standards of practice within the profession.
- Help students develop an overall understanding of the organizational structure of the athletic therapy placement program at York University

PRESENTATION = 7%

- Each group will present their assigned topic to the class, material must be evenly distributed among group presenters.
- Each presentation will be between 20-30 min.
- Present on the relevant research that you found and its efficacy.
- Presentation should include the following:

 - Explanation of the Topic to include relevant research.
 - Demonstration of the Topic how to perform/manage.

 - Conclusion
