Minutes of the 128th Meeting of Council September 12th, 2024, 3:00 pm to 5:05 pm | Zoom Meeting Room

1. Call to Order and Chair's Remarks

The Chair welcomed all in attendance and expressed a commitment to collegial, inclusive and respectful discussions at Faculty Council (FC) meetings. The Chair shared that a Joint vision statement was developed based on the LA&PS Executive Committee survey emphasizing that our council members must be consulted before important academic and financial decisions (impacting academic programs) are made from initial planning to implementation.

- 4. Business Arising from Minutes

There was no other business.

5. Reports of Standing Committees of Faculty Council

Executive Committee report

The Vice Chair presented the slate of all the remaining vacancies in the faculty council and its subcommittees for the academic year 2024-2025. The Vice-Chair extended an invitation to all members to nominate themselves or others from the floor of the Faculty Council, upon receiving no further nominations announced that the summer nominations period is closed. Acclamations have been finalized and the official election period will begin from Sep 13 – Sep 20, 2024.

Motion: Motion to include an introduction and orientation about the Faculty Council and its sub-committees in the October FC meeting

Motion was moved, seconded and approved unanimously. Motion carried.

A council member shared that the reasons for having Faculty Council Rules and Procedures regarding limitations on the number of members from departments on subcommittees is to ensure a fair representation of different areas of LA&PS. The Executive Committee deliberated that if there is a need the Student Academic Petitions & Appeals Committee may consist of a maximum of three members from any given department, while the Tenure and Promotions Committee will be kept at two members from the same department.

Committee on Research Policy & Planning: Year-End Report

The Chair of the Committee on Research Policy & Planning presented the year-end report to the council. Thanked all the outgoing members, currently serving members, Associate Dean de Costa, D. Cuff and staff. Council members did not raise any questions.

Academic Policy & Planning Committee: Year-End Report

The Chair of the Academic Policy & Planning Committee identified the 3 primary areas of focus for the past year while thanking all the committee members for their hard work. Council members did not raise any questions.

<u>Committee on Teaching, Learning and Student Success: Year-End</u> Report The outgoing Chair of the Committee on Teaching, Learning, and Student Success presented the year-end report to the council by summarizing the various initiatives undertaken by the committee.

Council members sought clarification regarding the implications of using ChatGPT and the changing nature of breaches of Academic honesty and how the new policy addresses these. It was suggested to bring this topic back for an in-depth discussion at future Faculty Council meetings.

<u>Committee on Curriculum, Curricular Policy & Standards: Year End</u> <u>Report</u>

The Chair of the Committee on Curriculum, Curricular Policy and Standards presented the year-end report to the council. Thanked all the outgoing and serving members, especially the outgoing Chair of CCPS for her dedication and hard work in the past years. Council members did not raise any questions.

6. Item for Presentation: LA&PS Co-op Program and the Senate Academic Conduct Policy

AD Buckley shared that the LA&PS Co-op Program and the newly implemented Academic Conduct Policy were launched on September 1, 2024.

The LA&PS Co-op is an optional, non-degree and work-integrated learning program that allows domestic and international students to gain up to 20 months of work experience. This is open to Full-time students enrolled in any of the LA&PS honors undergraduate degree programs along with additional requirements. This initiative involves students working full-time while taking a break from their studies. All Co-op students are paid by their employers. Extensive onboarding and training are provided before students can gain access to the specific job database. This will help students remove

barriers to entry into the workforce and explore networking opportunities.

A council member inquired whether students have the option to pursue international employment opportunities.

AD Buckley shared that currently, students are required to seek employment within the Greater Toronto Area.

A council member raised a question regarding the allocation of resources to this initiative considering the current financial and enrollment situation within LA&PS and the University. What is the number of students taking advantage of these opportunities and benefiting from it?

AD Buckley shared that there is no plan to grow the team because the onboarding and training will be done asynchronously. A \$50,000 micro-credential grant was awarded by the Ontario government for excellence in teaching aimed at developing these asynchronous programs. Over the past year, approximately 200 work-study positions were offered, while there were 250 active and nonactive student job seekers registered in the system.

Senate Academic Conduct Policy oversees academic integrity in and outside of courses. ASCP a Senate subcommittee created this new policy over a multi-year period which addresses the Generative AI and its main focus is to streamline the processes and language. The new policy frames the rights and responsibilities of students and units differently. Any breaches that occurred before September 1, 2024, will follow the old policy.

A council member noted that the new policy lacks clear procedures, particularly regarding the exploratory and the panel meetings. There is a need to remove biases, treat every breach as a single breach and practice consistency in sanctions and decisions.

AD Buckley shared that the letter templates, email templates, scripts, workflow document and standard LA&PS

recommendations/processes are being drafted and will be shared widely.

The Chair mentioned that AD Buckley will be invited to future Faculty Council meetings for more detailed discussions regarding the new Senate Academic Conduct Policy and ChatGPT.

AD Buckley urged all council members to ask any remaining questions and seek additional information they might require by email at adtl@yorku.ca. Alternatively, members may request meetings tailored to specific units.

8. LA&PS Dean's Report to Council: Enrollment updates

Dean McMurtry welcomed all and emphasized the importance of sharing information and openly discussing difficult situations to identify possible solutions. The last few years have been full of challenges beginning with the pandemic (COVID) followed by the unfortunate budget situation. Dean McMurtry expressed regrets for the pace at which decisions were made between January - June 2024 and encouraged thoughtful engagement among colleagues constructively and collaboratively. The landscape of Ontario universities is evolving, and it is essential to recognize that reactive decision-making is not the optimal path forward. A unified approach to decision-making is imperative for effectively addressing the issues that arise.

Next, Dean McMurtry provided the following updates on important events:

- 2000 LA&PS students attended the Orientation led by the colleges.
- The research team is hosting a DARE event on Tuesday, October 8 from 1 – 3 p.m. at Scott Library's Collaboratory to celebrate with the best and brightest from LA&PS and their research initiatives. This event is open to the public and no

registration is required. If you have any questions, please reach out to lapsrsc@yorku.ca.

Ontario Universities Fair is scheduled for Oct 5 & 6, 2024

Over the next few weeks, Dean McMurtry addressed the need to meet with all the department chairs, directors and UPDs to present them with the departmental cost structures and where costs exist within each unit. They will be provided with three scenarios for understanding the financial data for their respective department. Chairs and Directors will gather feedback within their respective units to analyze the data collaboratively. This will be succeeded by further meetings to address all the questions and concerns.

AD de Costa, AD Quirt and M. Harper will collaborate with the departments on course planning initiatives to reflect on the enrollment numbers.

AD Quirt will present recruitment and retention details at the October 2024 FC meeting.

Once the budget numbers are finalized by central, they will be discussed at future Faculty Council meetings.

Dean McMurtry urged all members to review the enrollment slide deck and supplementary news articles posted on the FC website.

- In the summer LA&PS was 281 FFTEs under target.
- On Nov 1, 2024, enrollment numbers will be finalized, however, there is an estimated 947 FFTEs projected undertarget for LA&PS.
- OUAC June 2024 data shows that York University is overall down by 16% while the sector is 1% up in terms of applications and acceptances.
- LA&PS is significantly down in enrollments compared to other faculties at York. This decline over the next 4 years will result in a negative flow-through effect on seats and courses in programs this will be an ongoing issue for the budget and course planning.
- Declines in 105 international and 101 international applicants significantly impact the budget.

 Winter intakes are important for the faculty, 105 international dropped from 500 to slightly over 100 applicants.

A council member inquired whether the current low enrollment numbers are exacerbated by the global financial and York's current budgetary situation.

Dean McMurtry responded that the combination of the two issues makes the situation more serious. Presently, many institutions are facing dire financial situations. The only way forward is to make collective decisions to resolve matters.

A council member shared that York University is facing significant challenges, including a decrease in international admissions. Previous strikes have contributed to this situation, and the substantial increase of over 5% in upper administration salaries has rendered it increasingly difficult for the university to adequately support its faculty and students.

A council member noted that there is an overlap between the current term and the subsequent term. The next cycle of recruitment has already begun. Some programs are not receiving the desired recognition and interest from students: what are the different initiatives being implemented by LA&PS and the university?

AD Quirt responded that last year was a good enrollment year after the strike we are in a recovery state, and initiatives such as attending open houses, hosting pizza lunches and lectures, writing conversion letters, facilitating high school student visits to York and hosting conferences have a significant impact on recruitment and conversion. All members are encouraged to share innovative ideas with AD Quirt by emailing adproace yorku.ca.

AD Jorge suggested that it is essential to refrain from making any negative comments regarding international students. It is necessary

to recognize the additional support systems available for them and to focus on retention efforts to ensure that the students currently enrolled remain in our institution.

Motion: Motion to extend the meeting time by 5 minutes Motion was moved, seconded and approved unanimously. Motion carried.

A council member mentioned that the strikes happened due to inadequate labor management practices and highlighted the university's approach to labor management over the past five to ten years. It is essential to communicate to upper administration the need for a revised strategy regarding labor management and to diligently engage to prevent strikes and reform labor management practices which will organically result in enhanced recruitment initiatives.

Dean McMurtry clarified that the strike issue frequently comes up in the results of the non-applicant survey, specifically by the students' responses and their reasons for not submitting applications to York University. Therefore, here it is mentioned as a reference only for information.

The Chair thanked Dean McMurtry for his presentation.






9. What best describes your engagement with LA&PS Faculty Council in the past year 2023-2024?




LA&PS Executive Committee Survey (2024-25)

Q1. What motivates you to attend the meetings of the LA&PS Faculty Council?



Q3 In your opinion, what academic initiatives or policies should be addressed at the LA&PS Faculty Council?







Q4 Which mode of delivery do you prefer for the meetings of LA&PS Faculty Council for the upcoming 2024-25 academic year?






Q7. Membership category at Faculty Council

Year-to-date Summary of the Graduate Committee Activity, 2023-2024

The following outlines major items of business considered by the Graduate Committee during the 2023-2024 academic year.

MAJOR ITEMS:

The Graduate Committee discussed and established a process to collect and verify changes to the graduate scheme policy. LA&PS graduate programs confirmed their alignment with the University's new grading scheme policy by ensuring their admission requirements meet the updated standards. On behalf of the Graduate Committee, the graduate committee secretary distributed the new grading scheme policy and grading scale chart to the programs. Each Graduate Program Director then verified with the Associate Dean of Graduate Studies and Research that their admission requirements comply with the grading scheme policy. The policy was presented to the LA&PS Graduate Committee and received final approval at the LA&PS Faculty Council meeting on May 9, 2024.

The Graduate Committee established a process to ensure that programs clearly present their thesis and dissertation formats in their academic calendars. The committee secretary coordinated with each program to verify and confirm that these formats were accurately included. In line with the Faculty of Graduate Studies' updated regulations effective summer 2024, graduate programs that require theses and/or dissertations must specify the supported formats in their academic calendars. The approved formats outlined in the updated FGS Regulations include Monograph, Manuscript-based, Complex Digital, and Multimodal. All graduate programs that incorporate theses and/or dissertations into their degree requirements have confirmed to the Graduate Committee that they have consistently supported these formats and have updated their calendar entries to provide clarity.

HSG3M: Gender Studies

OVERALL EXPECTATIONS

By the end of this course, students will:

- **B1.** The Social Construction of Gender: demonstrate an understanding of how attitudes, behaviours, roles, and norms relating to gender are socially constructed, and of the complexity of gender as a concept and as a lived experience;
- **B2.** Power Relations, Sex, and Gender: analyse sexism and the dynamics of power relations with respect to sex and gender in a variety of contexts;
- B3. Representations of Gender: analyse representations of women and men in media, popular culture, and the arts, and assess the effects of these representations.

SPECIFIC EXPECTATIONS

B1. The Social Construction of Gender

By the end of this course, students will:

B1.1 explain key terms and concepts relating to gender studies (e.g., sex and gender, female, male, transsexual, intersex, gender performance, gender roles, gender norms, gender stereotypes, transgender, masculinity/masculinities, femininity/femininities, gender binary, intersectionality, hypermasculinity, emphasized femininity, sexism, matriarchy, patriarchy, gender hierarchy, sexual minorities, sexual orientation, homophobia, two-spirited, misogyny, misandry)

Teacher prompts: "What is the difference between sex and gender?" "What is meant by the term gender performance?" "In what ways does some gender research challenge understandings of sex as a simple binary between male and female?" "What did Simone de Beauvoir mean when she wrote, 'One is not born a woman, one becomes one'?"

B1.2 explain how gender norms are socially constructed and may be culturally specific (e.g., the influence of one's culture, ethnic group, or heritage, and of the media and popular culture;

and young women, regarding acceptable behaviour and expression of emotion? Regarding career choices? What factors influence the maintenance of or changes to such norms/ expectations?" "Do you ever find yourself in conflict with the gender norms accepted in your family or community? If so, explain the circumstances and your response." "How might an individual's personal preferences and choices affect his or her self-presentation of gender?"

B1.3 analyse ways in which gender intersects with other aspects of identity (e.g., indigeneity, race, socio-economic status, sexual orientation, ability) to create diverse gender role expectations and experiences

Teacher prompts: "What does Patricia Monture-Angus, a Mohawk woman, mean when she writes, 'To artificially separate my gender from my race and culture forces me to deny the way I experience the world'?" "How might factors such as socio-economic status or (dis)ability influence a person's experience of gender?" "Why might it make more sense to use the terms masculinities and femininities without the proposition and femininities."
