newcomers in the neighborhouds of Montreal.

Montreal recently had to welcome new categories of migrants including a large number of Syrian refugees between 2015 and 2016 as well as

asylum seekers between 2017 and 2018. Local community organizations have to innovate for the succesful integration of a continously evolving migrant population. This challenge picked the curiosity of a team of researchers from Concordia University, led by Chedly Belkhodja, who started collaborating with TCRI and United Way to observe what is happening on the field.

We are grateful to Gabrielle Desilet for taking the time to work closely with the Knowledge Mobilization Officer to develop a research summary on this project. The summary gathers lessons learnt from the first phase of the research and it is available in French <u>here.</u> The English translation will be shared shortly. City of Toronto's Role in Immigration and Settlement

A recently published report by John Shields and Jessica Praznik examines the role of the City of Toronto in immigration policy and settlement and integration programming. Toronto continues to be the most significant centre in Canada for newcomer settlement and immigration is a leading factor behind the rapid population growth of this global city (the fourth

largest centre on in North America). Fully 35.9% of the total immigrant population in Canada call Toronto home and the city continues to be a powerful magnet for secondary migration. 46.1% of the city's population, based on the 2016 Census, is made up foreign-born residents (Praznik and Shields, 2018, p. 4).
