(CBIE) Ontario Regional Meeting by holding a panel discussion entitled "How Can Post-Secondary Institutions Nurture a Resilient Population of International Students?".

The CBIE Annual Meeting was hosted by the University of Windsor on June 10 and 11, 2019. The discussion was moderated by Dr. Francine Schlosser, while the panel was made up by Jacqueline Veres (University of Guelph) and Duncan Lam (University of Windsor).
