#### Update from the post-doc fellows at BMRC-IRMU:

- 1. Nahid Sultana is working as a postdoctoral researcher at the Odette School of Business, University of Windsor and the Windsor city network coordinator for Building Migrant Resilience in Cities (BMRC). At present, Nahid is involved in two research projects. In a project that aims to explore the involvement of institutions in matching immigrant newcomers with closing family businesses, Nahid is working with Professor Francine Schlosser of Odette School of Business, University of Windsor. For this project, she has submitted an application to the Research Ethics Board and obtained approval. Nahid has developed six interview protocols, three survey protocols, set up the surveys on Qualtrics, and prepared a research digest. - 2. <u>Jayesh D'Souza</u> is a researcher at BMRC-IRMU. He is working with the principal investigator, <u>Prof. Valerie Preston</u> and <u>Prof. John Shields</u> on immigration and resilience issues. The present study is about the future of the settlement sector as a result of the pandemic. The goal of this segment of the project is to understand how the settlement sector has been reshaped during the various waves of the pandemic. Jayesh has been involved in designing surveys for OCASI and TCRI and have assisted in conducting the surveys on Survey Monkey and analyzing the responses. The analysis will contribute to the objective of ensuring the sector's sustainability by improving working conditions and enhancing services to the vulnerable. Besides this, he has also completed a draft of a paper on immigration and resilience using best evidence synthesis.

Research digest on Explaining the Structure and Mechanism of Recruiting International Students to Community and Privates Colleges in the Greater Toronto Area, by Sutama Ghosh and Sohail Shahidnia, Ryerson University.

The economic benefits associated with the increasing admittance of international students to Canadian postsecondary educational institutions (PSEIs) is undeniable (Plumb 2020). With their numbers increasing annually, PSEIs are paying more attention to students from India. Currently, they are being admitted mainly to colleges rather than universities (CBIE 2020). This study investigates the recruitment strategies used by Canadian colleges to attract Indian international students.

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














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
