Multiple food vulnerabilities of international students from India in Greater Toronto Area colleges: A pilot study

In this study, <u>Sutama Ghosh</u>, Pruneah M. Kim, Raymond M. Garrison and <u>Sohail Shahidnia</u> attempted to create awareness about this specific form of inequality by qualitatively analyzing the experiences of 30 international students from India, in community and private colleges located in the Greater Toronto Area. Their study demonstrates that most participants faced multiple food vulnerabilities. In this regard, in addition to their internal characteristics, external circumstances have had profound impacts on their food insecurity, particularly the geographical context of the city in which they live. Our research exposes the structural inequities restricting digital access and use. It reveals the increasingly important role of emerging technologies in reducing barriers for seniors and facilitating aging in place. Central to this field is the exposure of three senior digital divides to 1. access to Information and Communication Technologies (ICT) 2. access to digital skills and how and identifies gradations of digital exclusion; and 3. expansion of those digital skills so that users can derive social, economic and health benefits from ICT use .
