Sharing how female migrants are currently engaged at community centres and different gender responsive programs and avenues (ie. the example of people getting volunteers and work experience and then having references and Canadian experience)

WHAT ELSE?


Challenges: good but still not really transforming gender roles; pay and types of roles migrant woman are getting are still low waged and often involve de-skilling women; Balance of meeting people where they are and responding to requests but considering how we perpetuate gender norms (i.e. women seeking a cooking or sewing group)

Opportunities to challenge wages and hiring practices both internally and externally; participate in conversations like this raising up experience and data we gain through our work; considering men's groups and what role we have in creating complimentary spaces and programs for men at our centres

Family Outreach Program



Family Outreach Workers are located at 36 sites across 18 catchment areas in the Region of Waterloo, and are flexible to meet with families in their communities from the Townships (Woolwich, Wellesley, Wilmot, Ayr and North Dumfries), to Cambridge, Kitchener and Waterloo.



Partnerships (such as this one) make our outreach work possible. We strive to reach most vulnerable, and reduce barriers to access. We continue to evaluate our program and implement best practices, taking into consideration family feedback as well as learning from our site partners.

HOW DO WE DO THIS?

Understand gender is creating barrier for women and being a migrant woman adds more barriers—

Recognize gender-based barriers and use our approaches to address it:

Showing scope of work; 16 workers across the Region 32+ sites

Hiring people with experience – sharing your experience and
perspective

Asking and encouraging migrant woman about ESL goals, levels, etc.; helping illuminate timelines to begin preparing for next steps after language + exploring childcare options
