



- Most claims are made at airports


Greater Toronto Area and Census Metropolitan Area




Toronto CMA, Newcomers 2011-2016

% of Total in Ontario


Toronto CMA, 2016



Immigrants in Toronto Suburbs




Average Nightly Number of Asylum-Seekers in Toronto Shelters




Labour Market Challenges

Chart 25 Core-aged university-educated immigrants: Wage-gap narrows progressively as time since landing increases, 2006 to 2017





Housing Syrian Refugees

- Housing challenges
 - Rapid unpredictable arrivals
 - High need
 - Low income

- Housing needed to be
 - affordable
 - suitable
 - adequate

Refugee advocates worry about rent costs as more than 900 refugees set to arrive

Just over 300 refugees per month to arrive before the end of December

The Khalifa family fled their bombed out apartment in Syria and relocated to Winnipeg almost a year ago. They are happy here and looking for a larger place to live. (Manitoba Interfaith Immigration Council Inc.)

With more than 900 refugees set to arrive in Manitoba before the end of December, Rita Chahal is worried about where they will live. She says if a rent supplement under the former NDP government is not revived, she doesn't know how newcomers will be able to pay their rent without dipping into their food money or federal child benefit.

Success in Toronto

Two and a half years after arrival, 79% of Syrian newcomers continue to live in the same home they moved into from temporary housing. 68% are happy with their present accommodations. (Making Canada Home, 2019)





But local landlords have stepped up to help, and it hasn't turned out to be that difficult so far. That's the general consensus among a range of people interviewed. Ottawa has welcomed government-sponsored 737 Syrian refugees, and 405 of them have moved into their own apartments or townhouses, said Chamrouen Lay, the manager of Maison Sophia refugee settlement house.

Usually refugees spend a month in temporary lodging while staff help them adjust to Canada and find a place to live. But the Syrians, who are housed at Maison Sophia and three Ottawa hotels, have been moving into permanent housing within two or three weeks, says Lay. Settlement staff have to make room for newcomers — there could be as many as 400 more Syrian refugees arriving by the end of the month, he said. But while it's been harder to find houses for large families, there's been no bottleneck.

- Newcomer integration is difficult and prolonged BUT it can be facilitated when:
 - Supported broadly by public
 - Rooted in institutional collaboration
 - Promotes innovation with resources and encouragement
 - Locally tailored
- Lessons benefit many marginalized groups



NEW UNDERSTANDINGS OF SETTLEMENT

- Immigration policies assume skills, work experience & education are key to successful settlement
- Principal applicants in economic class are chosen on basis of human capital. They do better than other classes of immigrants, particularly if they have Canadian experience before settling BUT...

Settlement is Complicated...

- Dynamic
- Contextual
 - When, where and how newcomers arrive
- Multidimensional
- Multiscalar
