

2023-2024 In Review

One of my final tasks as Interim Director was to write the ITS Annual Report, which provided me the perfect opportunity to look back on this past academic year. I was reminded that we had a busy Fall semester including highlights such as offering multiple funding workshops, cosponsoring a book launch for Lee McGuigan's *Selling the American People: Advertising, Optimization, and the Origins of Adtech*, hosting Kelly Fritsch and Anne McGuire as the first (of three!) Technoableism talks, and a lively roundtable to mark the 1-year anniversary of ChatGPT. We also became a co-sponsor for IRDL's *Get it Done, Together;* 134 people took part in the bi-weekly 3-hour pomodoro sessions this year. I am also pleased to report that we made significant progress towards our charter goal of supporting an intellectual environment for graduate students including hosting Nicholas Surber, a visiting graduate student from Chalmers University, launching the monthly *Graduate Student Writing and Publication Group*, and most recently, collaborating with colleagues at Université de Montréal and Queens University to launch *The STS North Summer School* (see page 3 for more details). Our numbers continue to grow across all three membership categories; I am especially proud to report the number of Graduate Fellows at ITS has doubled over the past year!

While we hosted many well-attended events in Fall and January—including the second Technoableism talk featuring Ashley Shew—the CUPE 3903 strike created a significant disruption across campus. Like many other ORUs, the ITS executive voted in favour of adopting a statement authored by the CFR that all events would be suspended for the duration of the strike, which meant postponing both Dr. Akil Fletcher's talk for Black History Month and the final installment of the Technoableism Speaker Series. The uncertainty surrounding the duration of the strike and remediation period led to the conference committee's decision to postpone our inaugural ITS research workshop and membership meeting to Fall 2024. New dates for all these events will be circulated in the next ITS newsletter.

I have also been working on administrative tasks behind the scenes, making sure ITS is poised to support your research and collaborations for years to come. The Institute for Technoscience and Society now appears in the list of grant administrators on SSHRC applications—please reach out if you would like to discuss how we can assist you with grant development and post-award administration. For folks who are planning events in the coming year, we can help with that too! ITS now has an Eventbrite, which makes handling seminar or event registration a breeze. And if you are looking to host a larger online event and are shocked at how much hosting a webinar costs, we can assist you with requesting access to the VPRI Zoom webinar license.

Fenella Amarasinghe is a PhD Candidate in the Faculty of Education,

York University. Her research considers the ways that ethics as an attentive relationship to the human and more-than-human world is



pedagogically-culturally constituted in engineering education. In addition, Fenella works with Dr. Jeff Harris on a cross-institutional study with colleagues from the University of Manitoba, Waterloo, and Memorial University, investigating the Tech Stewardship Practice Program launched by Engineering Change Lab and MaRS Discovery District.
