Chika Maduakolam is a full-time doctoral student in the Department of Socio-Legal studies at York University, where her main areas of research are conflict-related sexual violence and transitional justice. Her current research, titled "Prospects of a Transitional Gender Justice Framework Response to Gender-Based Violence", aims to understand the impacts of conflict-related sexual and gender-based violence (SGBV) through the experiences of young men and boys. She holds an LLM degree from Osgoode Hall law school and has worked as research assistant on an international research project on conflict-related sexual violence in war. Chika's award will be used towards travel costs for her field research in Nigeria, where she will conduct interviews to understand how survivors frame their needs for a responsive transitional justice system that centers their voices and expectations. She will also be presenting her research at the CSLA Conference at Congress 2024 in Montreal.



Valerie Lawson is a full-time Master's student in the Development Studies program at York University, where she is conducting research titled "Healthcare Access: An Analysis of the National Health Insurance Scheme in Accra, Ghana". This research focuses on the National Health Insurance Scheme (NHIS) of Ghana, as it represents a compelling case study that offers insights into the challenges and successes of a national health insurance programme. Valerie will probe into the factors leading to the occurrence of out-of-pocket expenditure (OOPE) on healthcare services within the NHIS and how this phenomenon affects the healthcare-seeking behaviour and financial well-being of NHIS subscribers. This award will be used towards travel costs for field research in Accra, Ghana, where Valerie will conduct interviews to explore the perceptions, experiences, and coping mechanisms of NHIS subscribers.

Japhace Poncian is a Senior Lecturer of Politics and Development Studies and Head of the Department of History, Political Science and Development Studies at Mkwawa University College of Education. He researches the political economy of resource governance and community engagement. His research outputs have appeared in Political Geography, Energy Policy, Review of African Political Economy and Extractive Industries and Society. He holds various awards including the Ruth First Prize (2022) for the best paper published in Review of African Political Economy, and Distinguished Researcher of the Year (2024) awarded by Mkwawa University College of Education.

Is resource nationalism necessarily bad? If so, why has it become a common resource governance tool in both developing and advanced economies?
What is the big deal in global resource nationalist politics?

In this presentation, I seek to make sense of the global wave(s) of resource nationalist politics by drawing on the recent experiences of Tanzania with resource nationalism. I seek to use various policy and institutional innovations born of resource nationalism in Tanzania to show that resource nationalism is not necessarily a bad thing.

The New Frontiers in Research Fund (NFRF) recently launched the 2024 Exploration stream competition. The Convergence Portal is now open for submission of a Notification of Intent (NOIs). A summary is provided below

Objective

The objective of the Exploration stream is to support high-risk, high-reward and interdisciplinary research. Researchers are encouraged to think "outside the box," undertake research that would defy current paradigms, and bring disciplines together in unexpected ways and from bold, innovative perspectives; and has the potential to be disruptive or deliver game changing impacts

Exploration stream grants support projects that:

bring disciplines together beyond traditional disciplinary or common interdisciplinary approaches;

propose to explore something new, which might fail; and

have the potential for significant impact.

Diversity of perspectives is important, and the fund encourages research proposals led from any discipline, from those in the social sciences and humanities, to health, and the natural sciences and engineering

Projects must be interdisciplinary. The nominated principal investigator and team members (if applicable) can be from any discipline, but the proposed research project must include elements from at least two different disciplines (as defined by a group-level classification based on the Canadian Research and Development Classification)

Early Researcher Award Competition: Application Process & Timelines

Please note the Round 18 competition for the Early Researcher Award has launched with an agency deadline of July 25, 2024.

Again this year, researchers will be required to submit an Internal Notice of Intent and to submit the Ontario Research Fund Mitigating Economic and Geopolitical Risk Checklist.

Please note: The Internal Notice of Intent form, Application Form and detailed program guidance is attached to this email.

The Early Researcher Award (ERA) program helps promising, recently-appointed Ontario researchers build their research teams of undergraduates, graduate students, post-doctoral fellows, research assistants, associates, and technicians. The goal of the program is to improve Ontario's ability to attract and retain the best and brightest research talent.

The Early Researcher Awards is open to all disciplines.

The funds are to be used over a period of five years to fund eligible expenses for a research team.

ELIGIBLE APPLICANTS

The ERA program is open on a competitive basis to researchers who:

are full-time faculty or principal investigators who, at the application deadline, are based at an eligible institution (see detailed guidelines);

have started their academic career on or after January 1, 2018; and

have completed their first Doctor of Philosophy, Doctor of Veterinary Medicine degree, Medical Doctor or terminal degree on or after January 1, 2013.

These timelines may be extended in the case of eligible career interruptions:

Section 9d of the application allows the applicant to provide the review panel with details on interruptions or delays. Failure to provide information will result in the application being deemed ineligible.

Industry positions, research associate positions and post-doctoral fellowships are not considered eligible interruptions.

Continued education, required training (e.g. medical training and fellowships), and parental leave are considered eligible interruptions, but must be clearly described in section 9d of the application. Specific dates are required. Failure to provide information will result in the application being deemed ineligible. Extension of eligibility is calculated at a 1:1 replacement (i.e., 300 days of leaves extends eligibility by only 300 days).

Note: Section 9d of the application should also be used to clearly explain, where applicable, how any previously held positions should NOT be considered as independent academic research appointments for the purposes of eligibility.

VALUE

Each award is a maximum of \$100,000 and must be matched by an additional \$50,000 from the researcher's Faculty or the private sector. In addition, up to \$40,000 will be provided to the researcher's Faculty by the Ministry for indirect costs.

EVALUATION CRITERIA

ERA applications will be evaluated based on four weighted criteria:

Excellence of the Researcher (40%)
Quality of the Research (30%)
Development of Research Talent (20%)
Strategic Value to Ontario (10%)

The applications will be ranked as exceptional, excellent, very strong, strong, moderate, or insufficient on these four weighted criteria.

It is suggested that applicants be within the last two years of the program's eligibility window to be genuinely competitive.

YOUTH RESEARCH & INNOVATION OUTREACH

Applicants are required to undertake annual youth outreach activities that primarily target high-school, middle school and elementary school students. Up to 1% (equivalent to \$1,000) of the funding provided by the government may be used for eligible expenses for developing and delivering youth outreach activities, including consumable supplies (e.g., materials for crafts, lab supplies). Funding provided by the institution and/or partner organization may not be used for youth outreach. Activities associated with youth outreach are to be undertaken during each year of the project.

Faculties will lead the development of nominations, and as such applicants are encouraged to contact their Faculty Research Offices regarding application support. The Strategic and Institutional Research Initiatives (SIRI) Unit at ORS will coordinate submission of the Full Applications, receive reference letters, and secure any required institutional signatures.

As well, to help support the nomination development process, SIRI and Research Commons will coordinate a mentorship program that engages previous York-based ERA and Premier's Research Excellence Award recipients. However, mentorship will only be provided on a demand basis at the request of the Faculty, and should target high potential applicants. If applicants are interested in
