The call for nominations for the CFR's 2023-24 Mary McEwan Memorial Dissertation Award is now open.

Named in honour of Dr. Mary McEwan, a feminist psychiatrist, this annual award of \$1,000.00 will be awarded to one PhD dissertation produced in the 2023-2024 academic year at York University in the area of feminist scholarship. An Awards Committee of faculty affiliated with the Centre will choose the winners.

If you have dissertations that were recommended for awards in 2023-24 (dissertations defended between September 1, 2023 and August 31st, 2024 are eligible), please consider putting them forward for this award. The submission deadline is November 30, 2024.

CRITERIA OF ELIGIBILITY

- 1. Must be a York graduate student who has successfully defended a dissertation during the 2023-24 academic year (September 1 2023-August 31st, 2024).
- 2. The nominee's dissertation must concern feminist theory and/or gender issues.
- 3. The examining committee for the dissertation must unanimously recommend it for an award.

PROCEDURE FOR NOMINATION

Each nomination must include:

- 1. The nomination checklist (see link below).
- A copy of the dissertation.
- 3. A one-page statement (max.) from the nominee about the contribution the dissertation makes to feminist scholarship.
- 4. A letter of recommendation from the student's Supervisor commenting on the nominee's dissertation or thesis.
- 5. A statement from the Graduate Program Director noting that the nominee's dissertation was recommended as one that should be considered for a prize.
- 6. A copy of the external examiner's report.

2024-2025 Canadian Heritage Funding - Minority-Language Education - Post-Secondary Sector and Scientific Knowledge in French Support Fund

The Minority-Language Education component supports the delivery by provinces and territories of educational programs and services to English-speaking communities in Quebec and Francophone communities outside Quebec. It includes all levels of education, and aims to increase the production and dissemination of knowledge, innovative methods and tools to support teaching in the language of the minority.

The Department of Canadian Heritage is introducing a new program subcomponent designed to support post-secondary education in the minority language and to support the mobilization of scientific knowledge in French.

In response to the challenges facing the production and dissemination of scientific information in French, the Government of Canada has introduced, as part of the <u>Action Plan for Official Languages 2023-2028: Protect-Promote-Collaborate</u>, a new \$8.5 million initiative over five years to support Canada's French-language research ecosystem.

The scientific knowledge mobilization component of this new initiative aims to:

contribute to the dissemination and promotion of scientific knowledge in French

promote better mobilization of scientific knowledge in French;

strengthen exchanges, linkages and networking between the scientific community and target partners;

have a strategic impact on the future of official-language minority communities and target populations.

Call for proposals for 2024-2025

Applications for the year 2024-2025 can be submitted on an ongoing basis for projects ending on March 31, 2025. The maximum amount eligible per proposal is \$70,000.

The call prioritizes targeted projects and activities related to the sharing and use of research results, including synthesis, dissemination, transfer, knowledge exchange and scientific popularization for the benefit of target users and francophone audiences in Canada.

Activities such as conferences, colloquia, congresses, round table discussions, and symposia are eligible, but priority will be given to the most innovative knowledge mobilization projects, activities and strategies.
